Context Statement and Highlights

Saddleworth Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 27. Saddleworth Primary School is classified as Category 4 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 11% Aboriginal students, 4% students with disabilities, 4% children/young people in care. Principals Report

Saddleworth Primary School (SPS) started 2023 with 26 students. We had a Junior Primary (JP) class of 13 students from years R-1-2 and Senior Primary (SP) had 13 years 3-4-5-6 students. Jenny Shepherd and Zoe Hier shared the teaching of our JP class, while Belinda Nichols taught SP and I taught the class on Thursdays to provide NIT. SSO staff were Belinda Altus, Mary-Anne Schwartz, Heather Lymburn, Rachel Schoenberg and Kristin Griffiths. Krystal Lines was our Pastoral Care worker, Darren Heffernan was the Groundsman and Luk was the cleaner at the school.

Student academic achievement was high across the school. Our phonics and phonemic awareness program and other supporting programs in JP are setting students up well for future learning. SPS teachers use the Brightpath formative assessment tool to measure individual student writing improvement and map next learning. This program has led to enormous improvement for all students. NAPLAN and PAT tests also showed improved academic improvement. Teachers and students have a lot to be proud of.

A highlight of the year was SPS hosting the second annual Small Schools Sportsday. This was attended by almost 150 students from Saddleworth, Manoora, Auburn, Watervale and Blyth Primary schools. This was a very successful day and is held up at Portfolio meetings as an example of how small schools can work together for the benefit of all students. SPS also won the point score trophy on the day which was the cherry on top. SPS students have often performed well against larger schools and this year our boys basketball team came third in the regional competition and we were all very proud again.

We were again able to do our fair share of school facility improvements. The SP classroom and hallway were painted as well as student toilets and new cisterns and bowls installed. The SP class has new laptops for 2024 and the sandpit has a new roof that should appear any day now.

2023 is my last year at SPS and I thank everyone for their support and friendships over the years and wish all the best for the school students, staff, families and the wider community.



NAPLAN Proficiency



Attendance Comment

Our overall attendance for 2023 was 86%. This is down .7 of a % from 2022. Our attendance target is 95%, however in a smaller school this target harder to reach if there is illness in a family as it is a larger percentage than a school with higher numbers. If a student is away our site process is to follow up and check in with families. We are fortunate in our site that families call in early in the day to notify the school of their child's absence.

Behaviour Support Comment

All staff have been upskilled in recent years and students are well supported in behaviour support. As such there have not been any suspensions at our site in more than 3 years. In general our students are enthusiastic, well behaved learners who understand and appreciate quality education for all. We are in a fortunate position that our parents/caregivers are positive influences and support staff with the Behaviour Management Policy.


Out of a possible 17 families we had 10 responses for our Parent Engagement Survey.
